What is L3CP?

Intelligence-Led Community
Policing, Community Prosecution,
Community Partnerships (IL3CP)

IL3CP IS A PROMISING MODEL OF POLICING that has the potential to benefit law enforcement, prosecutorial agencies, and communities.

IL3CP, developed in Rockland County, New York, blends a unique approach to community policing: connecting the criminal justice system and the community through seamless communication and partnerships.

COMMUNITY POLICING:

Recognizing that police can't solve public safety problems alone, community policing encourages agencies to build interactive partnerships with relevant stakeholders to develop solutions to the conditions contributing to public safety problems.

3

COMMUNITY PARTNERSHIPS:

Partnerships are established with citizen groups, non-profit organizations, government agencies, and private companies that have a common interest in reducing crime and community problems. These partnerships connect the community with the criminal justice system to establish a collaborative approach and unified response to crime and community problems.

COMMUNITY PROSECUTION:

Working cooperatively with police officers, Assistant District Attorneys (ADAs) attend local community meetings and develop relationships with residents to identify and resolve local concerns and crime problems. ADAs also utilize mediation or civil action to resolve cases in a more efficient and expedient manner.

and evaluate the IL3CP model in three pilot cities:

- **MESA, ARIZONA**
- **NEWPORT NEWS, VIRGINIA**
- **O SAINT PAUL, MINNESOTA**

RESULTS

Improvements in agency and community partnerships, community trust, and information sharing were clear benefits realized by the pilot cities. Police-prosecutor relationships were greatly improved and each pilot city voluntarily expanded IL3CP projects to other communities within their jurisdiction.
