377 U.S. law enforcement **officers** were **killed** in **vehicular** crashes in the **line of duty**.

66 U.S. law enforcement **officers** were **killed** in **motorcycle** crashes in the **line of duty**.

84 U.S. law enforcement **officers** were **fatally struck** by vehicles in the **line of duty**.

DRIVE SAFELY

Be cautious at night. Law enforcement fatalities from crashes occurred more frequently during the dark hours (8 p.m. to 4:59 a.m.).

What are the primary vehicle maneuvers involving officer fatalities?

Going straight 61%

Negotiating curve 19%

Maneuvering to avoid animal/ pedestrian/object

6%

BUCKLE UP

Law enforcement officers enforce seatbelt laws to promote driver safety. Don't forget to protect yourself by also buckling up!

Seatbelts **reduce** serious crash-related **injuries** and **deaths** by **about half.**

PAY ATTENTION AND STAY ALERT

In-vehicle technologies can be a distraction; make sure you're only using them when stationary!

In 2015, over **3,000** individuals in the **U.S.** were **killed** in motor vehicle **crashes** involving **distracted drivers**.
